

View from the Hill

Then you will know that that I am the LORD your God, and that there is no other. Joel 2:27

Let's imagine for a minute, you are all ears of wheat, or corn, or barley.

What growing season have you had?

Are you parched, not enough refreshment during the summer?

Did you get planted in soil without enough fertiliser? Maybe you are thinner and weaker than you should be. Perhaps pests have laid their eggs on you and you are being nibbled by small mouths, something else growing while you are diminishing. Did the rains come so hard that you were flooded, too long under water, your roots rotted? Did the late storms come? Battering you to the ground, sodden with hail stones? While we're there, mice and rats come to eat our grains. We have no defence except to wait for sun and drying wind.

Life can be very hard. But even so, you here have grown somehow, avoiding the mice and crows who wanted to eat your seed, the animals that burrow and disturb roots when young. You might have scars, disease, misery, as well as the joy of feeling the sun on you and the wind in your hair.

So now it is harvest time. Long ago the harvesters used knives, sickles, simple combines. The ears beaten flat were lost, rotting on the ground. Clever agricultural engineers built machines that could lift the ears up and harvest them.

If people are so clever that they can design ways to rescue crops, how much more amazing is God our Father, who can pick us up no matter what our circumstances, how beaten, battered, nibbled we are. Even rotten and half degenerating, God can rescue us. God wants us to grow tall, strong, to blow his wind of the Spirit through our heads, to see us nurtured with the right amounts of rain, nutrient and sun (symbolising Scripture, loving care from our neighbours, and understanding of God's supreme love for each of us). This life is not how God wanted it to be for his children. We have one idea about God's power, mercy and love in the cycle of the field, preparing, sowing, growing and tending, harvesting, and enjoying the fruits of work. By lifting up our heads and asking God, he will send a harvester for us, someone to pray, to bring us close to that Love that knows no barrier, no limit, no holding back. For if time or circumstance has brought us to the end of our life, God offers Christians eternal life.

If at harvest time, or in the still winter days, we find time to stop and reflect, we might see times when God has fed and watered us, sent help, brought a comfort, given us a time of rest and recovery. Then we can also see when we have been that help or comfort to others. I pray for all our readers. Rev Carollyn

Group Community Fire Safety – October 2018

Now we are moving into the cooler weather here are a few facts and tips to keep you safe:

Did you know?

- Around 100 fires a year are caused by faulty electric blankets.
- In England on average, 7,600 chimney fires occur every year

Heating your home.

Central Heating Systems

• <u>Have your Boilers, Fires, Flues and Cookers inspected and tested by a 'Registered Service Engineer'.</u>

<u>Open fires.</u>

- Be careful when using open fires to keep warm. Make sure you always use a fire guard to protect against flying sparks from hot embers.
- Make sure embers are under control and properly put out before you go to bed.
- Keep chimneys and flues clean and well maintained.

Heating your home (portable heaters).

- Always unplug electric heaters when you go out or go to bed.
- Try to secure heaters against a wall to stop them falling over.
- Only use gas or paraffin heaters in well-ventilated areas. Heaters consume oxygen so you could suffocate if a room is not properly

<u>aired</u>.

Using electric blankets.

- Unplug blankets before you get into bed, unless they have a thermostat control for safe all-night use.
- Store electric blankets flat, rolled up or loosely folded to prevent damaging the internal wiring.
- Test electric blankets every 3 years.
- Try not to buy second-hand blankets and check regularly for wear and tear. Replace your blanket when it is more than 10 years old.

If the electricity fails.

Be prepared, Keep a torch and batteries handy, where you can find them.

Alternative lighting

• If you have to use candles or matches always take special care. Put them out completely

before leaving the room or going to bed.

- Use a snuffer or a spoon to put out candles. It's safer than blowing them out when sparks can fly.
- Make sure candles are secured in a proper holder and away from materials that may catch fire like curtains.
- Keep a mobile phone handy so you can still make an emergency call if there is a power cut.

Smoke Alarms.

Please ensure you have a 'Working Smoke Alarm' on each floor of your property. Derbyshire Fire & Rescue Service recommends that you test your smoke alarms every week. Please remember to test smoke alarms for older relatives and neighbours who might find it hard to reach their alarms but are at greater risk - over half the people who died in home fires last year were over 65 years old. A working smoke alarm can buy you and your family the valuable time you need to get out, stay out and call 999.

But you're more than four times as likely to die in a fire if you don't have a working alarm.

By pushing the test button on every smoke alarm, people could save the lives of their nearest and dearest - children, parents and friends alike.

Planning your Escape Route.

If your fire alarm does sound, and you need to get out of the property it is always best if you have an escape plan ready and that the whole family knows where to go and what to do. Follow the basic instructions below to help you effectively plan your escape:

- Plan an escape route and make sure everyone knows how to escape.
- Make sure exits are kept clear. Remove obstructions!
- The best route is the normal way in and out of your home.
- Think of a second route in case the first one is blocked.
- Take a few minutes to practice your escape plan.
- Review your escape plan if the layout of your home changes.
- Keep door and window keys where everyone can find them.



RECIPE

CHEESE & VEGETABLE SOUP

4 medium carrots, finely sliced 2 medium onions, finely chopped 2 celery sticks, finely chopped 450ml (¾ pt) water 25g (1 oz) flour 300ml (½ pt) milk 100g (4oz) grated cheddar cheese 25g (1 oz) butter salt & pepper

- Put vegetables into a saucepan with 300ml (½ pt) water. Bring to the boil, cover & simmer for 20-30 minutes or until tender.
- 2. Pour in remaining water.
- 3. Blend flour to a smooth paste with milk & add to vegetables.
- 4. Cook, stirring, until soup boils, then simmer for 5 minutes.
- 5. Remove from the heat, add 75g (3oz) cheese & the butter. Stir until both have melted.
- 6. Season to taste & ladle into warm bowls, sprinkle with remaining cheese.

Archdeacon Christopher writes...

The Great Hesitation



the Buddha achieved enlightenment he hesitated. Was what he had experienced uniquely personal, unintelligible to anyone else, or was it something that

others, that had some content? Eventually he decided that he couldn't just keep it to himself and so he started teaching, which is continue itself in time. And it is important that why we know about Buddhism.

As we know too well, it's very easy to become transfixed by the minutiae of religious argument and to miss the main point. We seem to live in a world where it's much easier to communicate with people but, ironically, much harder to have a proper conversation with them about the things that matter, because we lack a shared staringpoint. The risk is that therefore give space

could be shared with Both of these stances express an important truth. Any system, religious or otherwise, needs to be able to mark its boundaries and individuals have the freedom to respond to what is on offer and to make sense of it for themselves. It is perhaps the genius of the Anglican way that it holds a mutually creative balance between the system and the individual.

Yet it is perilously easy for that balance to be disrupted, as some of the discussions in the Church of England and the Anglican Communion are warning us. 'Look before you social debate more generally. Is the way think', the philosopher Wittgenstein used to to salvation just a private affair, which you say. Giving in Grace - A Useful Resource for a Stewardship Programme



Geraldine and Joy -Members of St John's. Mickleover write...

In 2017, the request to increase our giving to the Common Fund was received as our Parish MAP suggested it was time to focus on Stewardship. Our PCC was invited to a presentation on "Giving in Grace" as a possible approach to this subject.

We were inspired - "Jesus talks about money almost as much as he talks about God and His heavenly kingdom, so we should not shy away from raising finance and giving with a congregation." We were appointed as a working group to research the resources and present a potential programme to the PCC.

We discovered a wealth of resources to explore. Not all samples or suggestions were appropriate for our situation but they provided a template and a baseline to work from. We were particularly inspired by the constant references to guotes in the Bible. We were encouraged to pray and preach on the subject of giving and discipleship, review giving trends, gather facts, create literature to present the situation to the congregation, ask for responses, follow up these responses and provide an opportunity for thanksgiving.

Giving in Grace is not a programme that can be rushed - it is by no means a "quick fix" but a way to encourage a culture of discipleship and stewardship to grow and develop. It involved three months of preparation and planning (praver and research), two months to present (preaching and literature) and one month to allow for responses and follow-up. It recommends that we focus on financial giving every three years and use the interim years to offer opportunities to consider the aiving of time and talents with a gentle reminder to feature and review our finances annually.

We received an overwhelmingly positive financial response to our Giving in Grace Stewardship programme, exceeding the targets we had suggested. However, we must also highlight the practical ways that members of the Church can respond through offering time and talents to assist with the mission and ministry in our Parish.

In 2018, we are focussing for one month on the opportunity to respond to God's love with time and talents to further the mission and ministry of the church in our community.
